In the 60's the folk band, the Byrds, had a hit... "


"To everything ...turn, turn turn; there is a season...turn, turn turn; and a time to every purpose under heaven."

2020 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition: Call for Entries

Submission Deadline: March 10, 2020

Essay Topic: Overwintering: Bee Survival through the Cold Season

Honey bees have developed special skills to overwinter in the United States. Please discuss one of these skills and then include a discussion about what you do to prepare your hives for winter. Include a photo of one of your hives, either using infrared technology or showing winter wrap, hay bales, special feeders, etc. to demonstrate how you prepare your hives for winter.

Put on Your Thinking Cap!

An essential judging criterion is the scope of research you put forth in developing the ideas behind your essay—accounting for 40% of your score. The number of sources consulted, the authority of the sources and the variety of the sources are all evaluated. Personal interviews with beekeepers and others familiar with the subject are valued sources of information and should be documented. Note that "honey bee" is properly spelled as two words, even though many otherwise authoritative references spell it as one word.

Eligibility:

The 2020 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition is open to active 4-H Club members only. The three prize-winning essays will be published in ABF Quarterly, the magazine of the American Beekeeping Federation. All authors of essays submitted to the national competition will receive a relevant book on honey bees, beekeeping or honey.

Dairy Ownership - Report from the State Dairy Committee

Fall 4-H Dairy Advisory meeting and passed a rule change to **allow** dual ownership between siblings WITH specific requirements to meet eligibility.

NEW Exception: Dual ownership between siblings will be allowed as long as all of the following criteria are met:

- A) They are bona fide siblings (sister, brother, step-sister/brother, half-sister/brother, adopted)
- B) All siblings on registration paper of animal(s) are of 4-H age and regular members as of Jan 1st of the current year. Cloverbuds are not eligible. For NY State Fair entries entered through FFA or endorsed by a breed organization representative will need to follow 4-H rules on age also for the Dairy Youth Show
- C) One sibling has to designate the animal as their project animal for the project year by June 15th of current year by filing and completing animal identification form.
- D) Completed animal identification form(s) needs to be filed with appropriate organization (4-H Extension, FFA or Breed Organization) to state youth designation by June 15th . A copy of this form also needs to accompany State Fair Dairy Youth Entry form being mail to Dairy Youth Superintendent along with the other required documents stated on entry form.
- E) Designation cannot change during the program year and animal must be shown and exhibited by designated sibling. F) Bred and owned recognition can be given to designated youth as long as dual ownership is a current and legal partnership filed with breed organization.

The complete list of 4-H and Dairy Youth Show Eligibility for NY State Fair Dairy Youth Show 2020 is available from the 4-H Office.



NY Ag & Markets update – 2.4.2020

840 RFID tags are RECOMMENDED; however, will NOT be required at fairs in 2020. The 4-H Office has a limited supply of RFID tags available at no cost to 4-H members.

2020 County and State Fair ID Changes

- · Applies to all NY county fairs and the NY State Fair
- · Proposed regulations apply to CATTLE and SWINE
- · WHAT?



Cattle not currently identified with an 840 eartag will need an 840 RFID tag (or 840 equivalent if from another country) in their ear upon entry to the fairs. Cattle with 840 Visual tags will be exempt through 12/31/2022.





- Swine not currently identified with an 840 ear tag will need an 840 RFID tag (or 840 equivalent if from another country) in their ear upon entry to the fairs. Swine with 840 Visual tags will be exempt through 12/31/2022.
- Nursing piglets accompanying their sow to a fair are exempt from official ID provided that their sow must be in compliance with all applicable requirements.

New Zealand Adventures!

This past November, I had the privilege of traveling to New Zealand with my parents to visit my sister Ellie who was studying abroad. From November 1st to November 10th, my mom, dad, sister and I toured numerous farms, saw countless fields of sheep and beef, and saw some of the most amazing scenery on earth.

Ellie had been there for nearly four months, staying with a family who owned a sheep dairy and helping out with chores on the farm while she attended Lincoln University in the exchange semester from Cornell University.

Farming in New Zealand is very different from the agricultural practices in the United

States. Sheep, dairy, and beef cattle are on pasture all year round, grazing the many paddocks throughout the country. Because of the year round grazing, there aren't barns as we see dotted all across our country. In fact, most farms in New Zealand only have a parlor, or what they call a 'milking shed' on their entire farm. The majority of dairy cows we saw were Holstein-Jersey crosses, and farmers out there focus on breeding efficient, environmentally low-impact cows.

Much of the country is conscientious when it comes to the environment, focusing on recycling, composting and re-using whatever they can. With the environment in mind, farmers have specific rotational grazing schedules, utilizing a variety of legumes and grasses, not needing as much machinery. We had the opportunity to see hundreds of cows and several farms, all with their own milking sheds. I also had the chance to help milk a herd of 200 sheep, a very different experience compared to dairy farming.

In addition to the agriculture side of the vacation, my family and I hiked several mountains, all with incredible views at the top. Ellie and I also swam with dolphins off the coast of Kaikoura and had the awesome experience of skydiving in Abel Tasman. While known for bungee jumping, New Zealand has many other exhilarating activities to offer, fulfilling any thrill seeker's desires.

Traveling in general provides invaluable experiences - gaining perspective on others' cultures and everyday lives. From hiking in forests where Lord of the Rings was filmed, to milking sheep, to skydiving from 15,000 feet, New Zealand was truly a trip to remember and a bucket list destination.
