Otsego 4-H Dog Program

In July, the Otsego 4-H Dog Program was able to hold in-person classes! Our focus was an introduction to the dog classes 4-H offers in Showmanship (Grooming & Handling), Obedience, Rally, and Agility. While each sport differs, they share several foundation skills that were demonstrated.

Two very important skills we worked on are the focus for the handler and focus for a prop or obstacle. By building focus for the handler, the dog learns to walk on a loose leash and to look to the handler for cues such as "sit" or "down." Building value for props and obstacles is also important in agility. An agility dog needs to be able to move away from the handler to perform the obstacle such as go through the tunnel independently—there isn't room for a handler and dog in there! We also used props in obedience and rally to help the dog be more precise in the behavior we're looking for. When doing a heeling exercise (leash walking), and asked to halt, the dog should sit very close to the handler's left side. To help aid in precision, I used a 12" x 12" piece of wood wrapped in vet wrap (so it's not slippery to



sit on). First, we build value for the dog putting feet on the board. Then, the board is placed on the floor for the heeling exercise. The handler walks up to the board and stops, then the dog places his feet on the board, and is in the perfect position to sit at the handler's side. Eventually, the prop is faded out as the dog understands his job of sitting next to the handler's side.

This fall we will be exploring AKC's virtual titling programs for a trick dog, agility, and rally. New handlers are always welcome, look for an official orientation in late September!

Scholarships Overview

Since the beginning, Chobani has been committed to sourcing the freshest milk possible from nearly 1,000 farmers in our local communities. From Chenango County, New York, to Twin Falls, Idaho, we work with farmers who share our values and sense of community. That's why we're excited to recognize young agricultural leaders we believe embody the Chobani spirit.

Senior Scholarships

These scholarships will be awarded to Junior Livestock Show participants, age 15-18 as of January 1, 2020. It is designed to help advance a youth's path to becoming local farmers and encourage leadership skills, personal growth and practical knowledge through further education, the purchase of new equipment or livestock, or other agricultural training opportunities.

All youth between the ages of 15-18 are encouraged to submit a **300-500 word essay** answering the following questions. Feel free to be creative!

- 1. Why is farming important to you, your family, and the community?
- 2. Do you think farmers have a role in protecting the environment? Explain why or why not.
- 3. As a member of the farming community, what would you do to ensure your worker's rights and well-being are protected?
- 4. Share your story! We would love to hear about your farm, what types of animals you care for, and learn who inspired you to be a farmer.

Junior Scholarships

These scholarships will be awarded to Junior Livestock Show participants, age 8-14 as of January 1, 2020. This scholarship is designed to help youth grow as farmers, whether it is further education, a startup farm, purchasing a first animal or attending an agricultural camp.

All Junior Livestock Show participants between the ages of 8-14 are encouraged to submit a **200-250 word essay** answering the following questions. Feel free to be creative!

- 1. What is your favorite part about farming?
- 2. Why is farming important?
- 3. Share your story! We'd love to learn more about when you started farming, what type of animals you have, who inspired you to be a farmer, etc. The sky is the limit!

2020 Terra Jackson Scholarship

This year, we will also present a scholarship to honor a committee member we lost two years ago who helped to establish this essay contest. In honor of her commitment to youth in agriculture, and the dedication she brought to the committee, a special scholarship of \$500 will be offered this year to recognize the most outstanding essay submission.

The Scholarship Awards

The scholarship recipients will be determined by representatives of the awards committee consisting of representatives from the Junior Livestock Show and Chobani. Three \$350 scholarships (Seniors), Three \$150 scholarships (Juniors) and the Terra Jackson scholarship (\$500) will be notified in August.

NYS Junior Dairy Leader Program and NYS Beginner Dairy Leader Program

First for the time being we are going to postpone taking applications and starting the next class of **Beginning Dairy Leaders**. With the currently health situation with COVID-19 and not knowing how things will be looking this fall with schools and campuses....and being a key objective to get on the Ag and Tech school campuses across NY with this group....we have decided to hold off on this program at least through the start of the 2021 year.

We are going to more forward with the **NYS Junior DAIRY LEADER program (JDL)** for the 2020-2021 year. Applications are done online at

http://4h.ansci.cornell.edu/animal-programs/dairy/nys-junior-dairy-leader-application/ and more information about the program can be found here also. I will communicate though that will look a little different for the next class. In the past this program is started out with the once-in-a- lifetime week long trip to Madison, Wisconsin for dairy tours, attending the National 4-H Dairy Conference and attending World Dairy Expo. With the current situation the National 4-H Dairy Conference and the World Dairy Expo are canceled for this fall of 2020. With the next JDL class....their program year will be ending with the trip to Wisconsin in the Fall of 2021. We do have uncertainty on when we can be in person for things so the plan is to start a little later this fall and/or do things on a virtual platform to start off.....there are things that we can do in this manner and then when we can be in-person....we will do the other workshops and tours. So if you are interested in the dairy field and want to learn more about careers, personal and professional growth.....please apply. The age for this program is 16 to not have reached their 19th by Jan 1st. Again, we will be doing all the things we have done for 21 years in the JDL program but the timeline and schedule will look a little different....instead of starting in late September and ending in August.....the program year will start later in the fall and will end shortly after the trip to Wisconsin in late September of 2021. We are here and ready to continue this great opportunity in leadership and career planning in the dairy and agricultural field.

For the Fall of 2021, the plan will be to take the 2020-2021 class (this will be at the end of their program year) and the next class of 2021-2022 to Wisconsin at the same time.
