#### 4-H CLOVERBUD GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

4-H Cloverbuds, the youngest participants in the 4-H Club Program, are enthusiastic, curious, creative, robust and resilient young people who are growing physically, cognitively, socially and emotionally though a period of rapid and often uneven development. The 4-H Cloverbud Program has been designed to meet the very special needs of these 5 to 8 year olds. The New York State Cloverbud Policy specifies a Cloverbud must turn 5 by January 1 of the 4-H club year and must have been enrolled in Kindergarten at the beginning of the school year.

- Safety Safety is always a concern in any program that involves youth. It is of particular importance when working with 4-H Cloverbuds (children develop mentally in the kindergarten to third grade level). When working with this audience and animals, it must be remembered that the safety of the youth is the primary concern and objective. The developmental levels of 4-H Cloverbuds may limit their ability to work safely in some project areas. Care must be taken not just with animals, but also with any 4-H Club activity that may include animals, large equipment, certain outdoor activities (games and athletic activities, water activities, etc.) or other situations where safety of youth would be an issue.
- **Recognition –** For 4-H Cloverbuds, recognition should be informal and equal for all participants. Cloverbuds may not be competitively evaluated against one-another, against older youth or participate in any class that ranks the child or their project animal. Cloverbuds can receive a participation ribbon; prize or other fun token that indicates every child is a winner! Expensive trophies, Danish ribbons and financial rewards are inappropriate.
- **Competition -** Competition takes the emphasis away from the process and puts it on the end product. Young children are fascinated with the process of accomplishing a task. Placing importance on the result rather than the process is in direct conflict with what is important to children in this developmental stage. The absence of competition reduces the importance of the outcome and frees each child to simply enjoy the experience of playing and learning. Research indicates that children under age 8 are not developmentally ready to participate in structured peer competitive events. "Exhibition Only" means neither youth, nor projects are ranked or placed. All participants are equally praised for their accomplishments in a show & tell type setting.

#### **CLOVERBUD 4-H MEMBER EXHIBIT AREAS**

#### 4-H PROJECTS/ENTRIES

- 4-H Cloverbuds may enter their 4-H projects in the Cloverbud category
- 4-H Cloverbuds are not judged. Cloverbuds will speak with evaluators and become familiar with the process of evaluation.
- All Cloverbuds will receive a ribbon of participation.
- Each 4-H Club Organizational Leader in cooperation with the 4-H Cloverbud member's parents or guardians should make a decision about whether or not this an appropriate level of participation for the individual 4-H Cloverbud.

#### CLOVERBUD 4-H CLUB DISPLAY - a showcase of your 4-H Cloverbud Club

- 4-H Clubs must pre-register by July 12 on the entry form.
- Each Cloverbud 4-H Club will be assigned a display area which is approximately 4' deep x 4' long
- This is an educational display
- The Cloverbud 4-H Club will receive a monetary award for their participation.

**4-H CLOVERBUD SHOWMANSHIP -** 4-H Cloverbuds will be allowed to participate in a special 4-H Cloverbud Showmanship Class for any animal species except horse, cattle & swine.

- All class participants will receive a participation ribbon. Participants will not be placed and monetary awards will not be given. This is a participation class, not a competition class.
- The 4-H Cloverbuds must have worked with the animal during the current 4-H Club year. The 4-H Cloverbud must be able to control the animal: halter and lead line is recommended where appropriate.
- Older 4-H members or an adult helping in the show ring is mandatory.

#### **Exhibitor Pre-fair Guidelines**

#### Cattle, Sheep, Goats, Swine, Llamas and Alpacas, Cervids, Misc. Ruminants

- Review the animal health requirements booklet including information for your species **before** your veterinarian arrives to inspect your animals. If you have any questions, **ask**.
- Your veterinarian is responsible for inspecting your animals and completing the certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI). Call **early** to avoid the last-minute rush when mistakes are made and there is no time to correct.
- Make sure **USDA approved official ear tags** are present on cattle and swine and USDA approved scrapie ID is in place on sheep and goats. Official ID must be applied to animals prior to regulatory testing and completion of the CVI.
- Llamas and alpacas require a microchip or ear tag. If a microchip is utilized make sure the veterinarian confirms the microchip ID or places one. If your animal is identified by a microchip, make sure you bring a working reader with you to the fair.
- ALL IDENTIFICATION MUST BE RECORDED. Make sure it is.
- Review the CVI carefully upon receipt to make sure all the information is correct including any required test or vaccination information.
- **DO NOT** stuff it in an envelope and assume all is well. The time to correct is before pulling them out at the fair. The CVI is your document, and you share responsibility if it is incorrect.
- If you are **importing** livestock from out of state, make sure the interstate requirements are met and you have a valid **interstate certificate of veterinary inspection.**

#### Poultry

- If your flock is participating in the NPIP program, schedule pullorum flock inspection and testing well ahead of the fair.
- If you're having your birds tested within 90 days of the fair, you must go to a pullorum clinic. Available clinics are listed on the Dept. website. No individual testing is available if you miss a clinic.
- Birds qualified by 90-day test must be identified by official leg band.
- **Bring documentation** with you to the fair in the form of a 1) current NPIP certificate, 2) 90-day test chart or 3) purchase receipt with NPIP certification within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

#### <u>Horses</u>

- **NY origin** horses must be accompanied by a negative EIA test report. The date of sample collection for the qualifying EIA test must have been *on or after January 1, 2023.*
- Imported horses (out of state origin) must be accompanied by an interstate certificate of veterinary inspection with a negative EIA test within 12 months prior to entry. Rabies vaccination information can be incorporated into the CVI.
- Drawing or photograph **must** match the horse.
- Rabies vaccination must be within 1 year of arrival at the fair and be documented by a **signed** rabies certificate or a signed statement on the EIA test chart with the required information (see requirements).

#### MOST IMPORTANT

When you are loading your livestock for the trip to the fair, take the time to examine them. Make sure they are the same animals that are on the paperwork and official ID is present and legible. If they are showing any signs of illness, **LEAVE THEM HOME.**

#### **General Prohibitions and Requirements**

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds for any reason (show, exhibit, raffle, demonstration, display) during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- Any animal which is subject to inspection upon entry to the fairgrounds will be inspected without covering (wraps, coats, head gear, etc.).
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to, or require removal from, the fair premises or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of, or exposed to, any infectious, contagious, or communicable disease.

<u>NOTE</u>: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious, or communicable disease

(Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.

• All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

#### Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, alpacas, deer, and misc. ruminants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian. Wet ink signatures for paper CVIs or e-signature for eCVIs are acceptable.
- A physical CVI must be available to inspection staff for date and approval at time of inspection. This may be a printout of an eCVI or owner's copy of a paper CVI.
- All animals must be officially identified. **ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED.** Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- Only one species is allowed per certificate.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.

#### New York Origin Livestock:

- A valid intrastate CVI (AI-61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI (see below).
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.

#### Out of State Origin Livestock:

- All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- An e-CVI may be issued but a paper copy of the e-CVI is required for the animal check-in process.
- The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a NY fair must be within 30 days of the date of CVI inspection. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a NYS Agriculture and Markets official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

#### Animal Identification

- ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED
- Cattle must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended.
- Sheep and goats must be identified by official scrapie identification (see sheep and goat sections below).
- Swine must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended. Nursing piglets originating within NYS do not have to be individually identified if the sow is correctly identified on the CVI and the number of piglets in the litter is noted on the CVI. Nursing piglets from out of state will need official ID (see swine section).

- Llamas and alpacas must be identified by official ear tag or microchip.
- Misc. ruminants must be identified by unique ear tag or microchip.
- A complete written description is sufficient identification for horses entering New York accompanied by a CVI. The description must match the EIA test record. Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars, and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse. Tattoos and microchips if any should be included. "Bay, no markings" is not an acceptable description for a CVI or EIA test record.
- <u>NOTE</u>: If you are exhibiting animals identified by microchip, a working reader must be supplied by the exhibitor.
- For questions on animal identification please contact your veterinarian or our office at 518-457-3502.

#### Rabies Vaccination

- Rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) **and** that are *4 months of age or older* on the date of admission to the fair.
  - For most rabies vaccines, the earliest age allowable for primary vaccination is 3 months (12 weeks). Animals that are vaccinated prior to 84 days of age will need to be re-vaccinated according to label before entering the fairgrounds.
- Vaccine must have been administered within the past 12 months. The exception is Imrab LA vaccine used in sheep which protects for 3 years after the second annual vaccination (consult your veterinarian).
- The rabies vaccination requirement must be met on the day of admission even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.
- <u>NOTE</u>: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors. The <u>New York State Fair</u> requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

#### Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the veterinarian administering the vaccine or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration, and the duration of immunity if longer than one year (sheep only).
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on a paper EIA test record, the test record must be signed certifying vaccination in addition to the required signature for the EIA test record.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is electronically entered into an eEIA test record, only one electronic signature is required.
- <u>NOTE</u>: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.

#### BVD-PI Testing

• All cattle, llamas, and alpacas exhibited at NY county fairs, or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect **Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI)**. Official ID must be in the animal prior to sampling. 12

The testing veterinarian is responsible to make sure the proper test is conducted. This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, official identification of the animal, and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable, the test must be repeated.

#### Cleaning and Disinfection

• All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).

#### Animal Deaths

• Occasionally animal deaths occur at a fair. If a death occurs, it must be reported to the state veterinarian in charge as soon as possible for review. The animal must be promptly removed from the public exhibit area to a secure location and held for the veterinarian prior to disposal.

#### Calving, Kidding, and Lambing

• Any cattle, goats, or sheep that calve, kid, or lamb while at a county fair or the State Fair will be **ordered removed from the fairgrounds** along with their offspring, unless the animals are part of a birthing demonstration.

#### Commingling of Sheep and Cattle

• Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is strongly recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.

#### Commingling of Swine and Poultry

• Due to the potential spread of influenza virus, it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations.

#### Isolation on Returning Home

• The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin. If any illness is noted in the exhibition animals, the owner should contact their veterinarian immediately.

#### Individual Species Requirements

<u>Horses</u>

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is <u>not</u> required for New York origin horses. CVI is required for imported horses. Extended Equine CVIs (EECVIs) are acceptable. For more information on EECVIs, visit <u>http://www.globalvetlink.com</u>.
- Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months
  of age or older. The horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test
  record, signed by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian. The sample collection date
  for the qualifying EIA test must have been on or after January 1, 2023, for New
  York origin horses. For imported horses, the EIA test must have been conducted
  within 12 months prior to entry. The EIA test certificate must include a complete
  description of the horse.

• Rabies vaccination within 12 months is required for all horses 4 months of age or older (see above).

#### <u>Cattle</u>

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- Rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 4 months of age or older (see above).
- All cattle must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The existing, official identification, date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- All cattle must be vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with an age appropriate- product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for these diseases for the duration of the fair. The date and vaccine product should be documented.

#### <u>Sheep</u>

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved scrapie identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> registration tattoo or 3) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> flock tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program, and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the sheep's registration paper. ET tattoo in the ear or tail web. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
- Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 4 months of age or older (see above).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of sore mouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the affected animals (and any small ruminants from any other flock on the same conveyance to the fairgrounds) shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

#### <u>Goats</u>

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved scrapie identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> registration tattoo or 3) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the goat's registration paper. ET tattoo in the ear or tail web. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of sore mouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals (and any small ruminants from any other flock on the same conveyance to the fairgrounds) shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

#### <u>Swine</u>

• Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. Out of state nursing piglets need official identification along with the sow. See Animal Identification section above.

#### Llamas and Alpacas

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- All llamas and alpacas must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The existing, official identification, date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

#### Poultry

- Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons, and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition <u>OR</u> 2) proof that the birds originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.
- Poultry qualified by 90-day test must be identified by official leg band.
- Proof of NPIP status must be in the form of an NPIP certificate or purchase receipt containing NPIP certification information. If utilizing a receipt, it must be dated within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

#### Deer/Elk (Cervidae)

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- Originate from a herd classified as accredited or qualified under USDA tuberculosis regulations.
- A movement permit obtained from the Division of Animal Industry is required for all deer movements. All CWD and TB program requirements must be met before a permit will be issued. Questions regarding movement permits should be directed to the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3502.

#### Miscellaneous Ruminants

• Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.

#### **Exhibitor Pre-fair Guidelines**

#### Cattle, Sheep, Goats, Swine, Llamas, and Alpacas, Cervids, Misc. Ruminants

- Your veterinarian is responsible for inspecting your animals and completing the certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI). Call **early** to avoid the last-minute rush when mistakes are made and there is no time to correct.
- Make sure **USDA approved official ear tags** are present on cattle and swine and USDA approved scrapie ID is in place on sheep and goats. Official ID must be applied to animals prior to regulatory testing and completion of the CVI.

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- ALL IDENTIFICATION MUST BE RECORDED. Make sure it is.
- Review the CVI carefully upon receipt to make sure all the information is correct including any required test or vaccination information.
- **DO NOT** stuff it in an envelope and assume all is well. The time to correct is before pulling them out at the fair. The CVI is your document, and you share responsibility if it is incorrect.
- If you are **importing** livestock from out of state, make sure the interstate requirements are met and you have a valid **interstate certificate of veterinary inspection.**

#### **Poultry**

- If your flock is participating in the NPIP program, schedule pullorum flock inspection and testing well ahead of the fair.
- If you're having your birds tested within 90 days of the fair, you must go to a pullorum clinic. Available clinics are listed on the Dept. website. No individual testing is available if you miss a clinic.
- Birds qualified by 90-day test must be identified by official leg band.
- **Bring documentation** with you to the fair in the form of a 1) current NPIP certificate, 2) 90-day test chart or 3) purchase receipt with NPIP certification within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

#### <u>Horses</u>

- **NY origin** horses must be accompanied by a negative EIA test report. The date of sample collection for the qualifying EIA test must have been *on or after January 1, 2023.*
- Imported horses (out of state origin) must be accompanied by an interstate certificate of veterinary inspection with a negative EIA test within 12 months prior to entry. Rabies vaccination information can be incorporated into the CVI.
- Drawing or photograph **must** match the horse.
- Rabies vaccination must be within 1 year of arrival at the fair and be documented by a **signed** rabies certificate or a signed statement on the EIA test chart with the required information (see requirements).

#### MOST IMPORTANT

When you are loading your livestock for the trip to the fair, take the time to examine them. Make sure they are the same animals that are on the paperwork and official ID is present and legible. If they are showing any signs of illness, **LEAVE THEM HOME.**

New Order Requires Lactating Dairy Cattle to Be Tested and Show Negative Results for Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) Within Seven Days Prior to Showing, Costs to be Covered by USDA APHIS

No Cases of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) Have Been Detected in New York Livestock to Date

#### State and Federal Import Orders Remains in Place; Farmers are Encouraged to Monitor Animal Health and Practice Good Biosecurity

The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets today announced new testing requirements for dairy cattle entering fairs or exhibitions to continue to prevent the transmission of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in dairy cattle in New York State. The order issued by the Department requires that lactating dairy cattle be tested and show negative results for HPAI within seven days prior to entering a fair, including the Great New York State Fair, county fairs, or other exhibitions. The test must be conducted by an approved National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) lab.

**State Agriculture Commissioner Richard A. Ball said,** "With the kick-off of summer fair season just a few weeks away, we want to remain vigilant about the concerns of HPAI in dairy cattle we are seeing across the country and ensure we are doing all we can to keep our livestock safe and healthy here in New York. By requiring this testing protocol, which will be covered, we hope to minimize the risk of the spread of HPAI while providing the opportunity for the summer traditions of entering and showing of dairy cattle at fairs and exhibitions to continue."

**State Health Commissioner Dr. James McDonald said,** "The Department of Health supports this latest biosurveillance protocol as we enter the summer fair season in an effort to prevent the spread avian influenza in dairy cattle in New York State. As a reminder, there are still no known cases of avian influenza in livestock or in humans in New York State, and we will continue to work with the Department of Agriculture and Markets to monitor the situation and prepare for any potential risks to public health and safety."

The Department encourages industry members to follow these steps in addition to the state's order to help ensure the health and safety of animals at county fairs across New York, in addition to The Great New York State Fair. Animal health requirements for 2024 county fairs and The New York State Fair are outlined in three documents, listed below. These documents currently apply to animals, including poultry, at fairs in 2024.

### DEPARTMENT 17 – HORSES JUNIOR DEPT: 4-H, FFA and FCCLA Exhibits

- Participation is open to young people who are actively participating in an educational 4-H horse program under the direction of a volunteer 4-H horse project leader approved by Cornell Cooperative Extension's Schoharie County 4-H Program, or a vocational agriculture student carrying out a supervised horse husbandry program under the direction of a vocational agriculture teacher of one of the Schoharie County vocational agriculture departments.
- 2. All equines must have been officially designated as the member's project animal by June 1 of the current year. A copy of the completed horse/donkey/mule certificate must be on file with the Cooperative Extension Office by June 1. Members may designate up to 4 personally or family owned equines as project animals and one non-owned backup equine. Each equine must be entered separately. The same horse cannot be used for different riding levels within a discipline. Members with owned or family horses may lease a horse as a backup and must follow all Schoharie County 4-H Horse Program Policies. (\*) This horse will not be eligible to go to State Fair. Members may lease a horse, donkey or mule & for driving and a mini for those classes. Members not owning or using a family owned equine may designate two non-owned equine by June 1. Only one non-owned riding equine may be shown. The exhibitor must have cared for all entries continually since June 1 of the current year. A non-owned equine may be shown by different youth in different Divisions. A non-owned equine may not be shown by multiple youth in a given Division.
- 3. All youth who are exhibiting for their first time at the Sunshine Fair, and whose horse or horse/rider combination has never exhibited at the fair must be evaluated at a 4-H sponsored riding evaluation. If the youth is unable to attend the 4-H evaluation in Schoharie County, they may attend another county's 4-H evaluation event. Proof of evaluation in another County's 4-H program must be provided to the Schoharie County 4-H office prior to the Sunshine Fair Show date or the youth will not be permitted to ride in the show.
- 4. Schoharie County Helmet Policy: All youth participating in an official 4-H activity, event or show, shall wear a properly fitted and secured, officially approved ASTM/SEI protective helmet <u>at all times</u> when leading, handling, mounted on an equine, or seated in a vehicle being pulled by one or more equines. This age requirement overrules New York State Rules. Failure to comply with this rule will result in dismissal from the show. Per New York State Law No. VAT1265, all riders 17 years of age and under must wear a helmet meeting or exceeding ASTMFII63 (Safety Equipment Institute Certified) equestrian standard. The parent/guardian who signs the release form for an exhibitor 17 and under is personally responsible for seeing that those exhibitor(s) in their care, custody and control, obey this law.
- 5. <u>Making Entries</u> Every participant must be properly entered in order to compete. Read general rules and regulations governing participation in fair and also rules and regulations for Department. Late entries cannot be accommodated. Entries should be received by July 6th. The address/payee is Cobleskill Agricultural Society, PO Box 249, Cobleskill, NY 12043.
- 6. No stallions allowed.
- 7. Exhibitors must purchase a youth exhibitor pass.
- 8. Exhibitors shall wear numbers clearly visible on their backs.
- 9. Requests for stall arrangements **must** be submitted with entry form. Requests will be acted on and stall assignments will be made by the director or superintendent in charge of youth horse program.
  - a. Overnight Stall RentalFees: for 4-H days only are free. If you enter into an open Horse class you will be charged the \$12 per day stall fee.
- 10. Camper requests must be submitted on the entry form.
- 11. Horses must remain on the trailer until the required health and ownership papers have been checked. There shall be no unsupervised riding or driving of Junior Exhibitor animals housed on the fairgrounds at any time. All riding and leading on roadways is to be at a walk only. Pedestrians have the right of way. Schooling is allowed only in designated area.
- 12. The number of horses allowed in a class will be left to the judge's discretion, with input received from the Junior Department Show Superintendent.
- 13. Riders may only show at the level that the horse rider combination has been evaluated at.
- 14. Any w/t horse rider combination that breaks gait for more than 3 strides in two classes will be disqualified for the remainder of the show.
- 15. Class descriptions and judging shall be according to "NYS 4-H Horse Show Rules & Regulations". Copies are available at the Cooperative Extension Office.
- 16. No equine may be ridden without a bitted bridle except during the Gymkhana division when a hackamore may be used.
- 17. Appropriate bits and attire should be used. English wear and equipment should only be used in English classes. Western wear and equipment should only be used in Western classes. Western riders should only be using one hand to ride, with the exception of junior horse.
- 18. There shall be no horses on the ground around the 4-H Show Ring that are not bona fide 4-H project animals.
- 19. There shall be no horses past the draft barn towards the midway at any time.
- 20. Horses may come onto the fairgrounds after 3p.m. on the Monday before the fair start date.

- 21. Junior Department exhibitors must be chaperoned by parent/guardian of 21 or older at all times.
- 22. Junior Department exhibitors remaining on the grounds overnight must be in their sleeping quarters by 11 p.m. No exhibitors may be in the barns after 11 p.m. No grooming of animals after 11 p.m.
- 23. Youth must be present at the time of judging. Each member is expected to be responsible for the showing and care of his or her own animal. Exceptions can be made under such circumstances or conditions as the agriculture educator may determine necessary. Up to two entries per class will be allowed. If an exhibitor has two entries in a class, the second entry must be shown by another youth who is also exhibiting in the show. Adult assistance is permitted on a case by case basis with the approval of the Cooperative Extension representative.
- 24. Any member of this department found conducting themselves in an improper manner or who violates any of the rules set forth will forfeit any guarantee of premiums and may be dismissed from the fairgrounds with exhibits.
- 25. All equines are to be properly maintained by the exhibitors at all times.
- 26. W/T-Green or Gaited Horse classes are for youth that has three gait experience with junior horse of youth with a gaited horse

#### General Rules & Regulations for Livestock & Poultry (Excluding Horses)

- 1. Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members, or FFA, or agricultural education student enrolled in a Schoharie County elementary, middle or high school during the previous school year. Youth must be at least 8 years old to exhibit in premium classes. Youth who are between 5 and 8 years old, may exhibit for participation only in classes designated as CLOVERBUD classes.
- 2. All exhibits in this department will be governed under the same general rules and regulations that apply to other departments.
- 3. Entries should be postmarked by July 6th, unless specified otherwise. The address and payee is Cobleskill Agricultural Society, PO Box 249, Cobleskill NY 12043. No fee is required to enter except for the purchase of entrance tickets.
- 4. No Late entries will be accepted.
- 5. Exhibitors 18 and under must purchase a \$5 Youth weekly exhibitor ticket. The \$5 Youth Exhibitor ticket will be issued to the exhibitor upon placement of their entry. Otherwise, exhibitors and contestants must abide by regular admission regulations see general rules.
- 6. No passes will be mailed. All passes will be distributed by the Department Superintendents upon delivery of items for judging.
- 7. Submission of an entry implies the exhibitor has read and agrees to the Fair's General Rules and Regulations and the Department's Rules and Regulations plus all the Animal/Poultry Health Rules & Regulations.
- 8. Youth must be present at the time of judging. Each member is expected to be responsible for the showing and care of his or her own animal. Exceptions can be made under such circumstances or conditions as the agriculture educator may determine necessary. Up to two entries per class will be allowed. If an exhibitor has two entries in a class, the second entry must be shown by another youth who is also exhibiting in the show. Adult assistance is permitted on a case by case basis with the approval of the Cooperative Extension representative.
- 9. The awarding of ribbons and premiums shall be at the judge's discretion. The Danish system of awards will be used except where noted for all Junior Departments.
- 10. Animals/poultry cannot be put into housing until approved by Vet. Proper certificates and tags required. Drop off times are Sunday & Monday, August 4th & 5th from 9 am to 1 pm for all animals. All stalls, pens or cages must be labeled with contact person's name and best phone number.
- 11. All livestock exhibits will be released 7 p.m. on Sunday, August 11<sup>th</sup> and must be off the grounds before noon Monday, unless specified differently. Due to the release time and other activities on the grounds, extra measures have been taken to insure that safety and traffic patterns are not impacted in any negative way. Exhibits leaving before the permitted time will forfeit their premium money.
- 12. Footwear: Exhibitors are not permitted to wear flip flops in the animal barns. Sneakers or barn boots are strongly suggested.
- 13. Cloverbud Classes: Youth between the ages of 5 and 8 as of January 1 are considered Cloverbuds. Cloverbud aged youth may only enter designated Cloverbud classes for prizes and ribbons only. Cloverbuds may not enter premium classes.
- 14. It is expected that all Junior Department exhibitors will act in an appropriate manner. Any member of this department found conducting themselves in an improper manner or who violates any of the rules as set forth will forfeit any guarantee and premiums due and may be dismissed from the fairgrounds with exhibits. In addition, any parent displaying unsportsmanlike conduct may be subject to dismissal from the show grounds.
- 15. Junior Department exhibitors are urged to go home each evening. Exhibitors remaining on the fairgrounds must be chaperoned by a parent or guardian 21 or older. 16. Junior Department exhibitors remaining on the grounds overnight must be in their sleeping quarters by 11 p.m. No exhibitors may be in the barns after 11 p.m. No
- Junior Department exhibitors remaining on the grounds overnight must be in their sleeping quarters by 11 p.m. No exhibitors may be in the barns after 11 p.m. No clipping of animals after 11 p.m.

#### JUNIOR DEPT - DAIRY

The purpose of the Junior Department Dairy and Livestock shows are to teach the fundamentals of good livestock husbandry, to emphasize production and quality in farm animals, to stress the breeding of better livestock, to aid in developing a stronger county program, to demonstrate the finer points of fitting and showmanship, and to provide recognition and a fitting climax to each year's efforts of boys and girls.

- Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members or active FFA members enrolled in a Schoharie County FFA program. Youth participants must be at least 8 years of age by January 1<sup>st</sup> of current club year and not have reached their 19<sup>th</sup> birthday prior to January.
- Exhibitors must adhere to Animal Health Requirements for Admission to New York State and County Fairs for the current show season. (Refer to the beginning of premium list for more information).
- Showmanship and Dairy Cattle will be shown on Wednesday, 8/9 @ 9am.
- No substitutions are allowed.
- All exhibitors must be in the ring for the entire class in order to receive a premium for that class. In the event that the Junior Exhibitor cannot handle his or her animal, the exhibitor must still have some control of the halter to receive a premium.
- Cattle may be registered or non-registered must fit A. or B.
  - A. All registered animals entered must have registration papers showing ownership by the exhibitor. Registration papers should be available to present during the fair.
  - B. All grade animals must have a grade ownership certificate. Grade ownership certificates are available from the Cooperative Extension Office and must be complete with all required signatures, but are not required to be on file. However, certificates should be available to present during the fair..
- Cattle may be either owned or non-owned must fit A. or B.
  - A. All owned cattle must be personally owned and registered to the youth exhibitor as well as cared for by that exhibitor by no later than June 1 of the current year. However, youth should be working with their project animal(s) care. Dual ownership or syndicates are not allowed.
    - \* We will check ownership paperwork

\*NEW EXCEPTION: Dual ownership between siblings will be allowed as long as all of the following criteria are met:

- 1. They are all bona fide siblings(sister, brother, step
  - sister/brother, half sister/brother, adopted).
- 2. All siblings on registration paper of animal(s) are of 4-H age and regular members as of

Jan. 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year. Cloverbuds are not eligible. For NY State Fair entries entered through FFA or endorsed by a breed organization representative will need to follow 4-H rules on age also for the Dairy Youth Show.

- One sibling has to designate the animal as their project animal for the project year by June 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year by filing and completing animal identification form.
- Completed animal identification form needs to be filed with the appropriate organization (4-H county extension, FFA or Breed organization) to state the youth designation by June 1<sup>st</sup>.
- 5. Designation cannot change during the program year and animal must be shown and exhibited by designated sibling.
- 6. Bred and owned recognition can be given to designated youth as long as dual ownership is a current and legal partnership filed with breed organization.
- B. All non-owned cattle must be designated in the youth exhibitor's name and cared for by that exhibitor no later than June 1 of the current year. However, youth should be working with their project animal early on in the project year and should be assuming much of the responsibility for the animal's care.

Non-ownership is not available to youth already owning registered dairy cattle. One non-ownership certificate and the non-ownership rules and guidelines, properly filled out and signed by all parties must be completed and returned by the June 1 deadline. These forms are available from the Cooperative Extension Office. A copy of the non-ownership certificate should be kept by the exhibitor and be available to present during the fair. Youth are limited to showing two non-owned animals. Dual designation of one animal is not permitted.

- Every animal must be accompanied by proper health certificates. Health requirements are the same as those for open class dairy exhibitors. Any animal disqualified for participation in the Fair should be removed from the grounds by the end of the same day.
- Bedding, hay and grain must be furnished by the exhibitor.
- All animals must be housed in the stalls designated by the Dairy Superintendent throughout the duration of the fair.
- Whites are obligatory for all youth showing for the Jr. Dept. Dairy Show on Wednesday. White pants are required for all breed classes though a farm shirt or other solid color shirt is acceptable. Appropriate footwear (preferably boots, but protective footwear is required) must be worn at all times. Flip flops should not be worn in the barn.
- Please see Department 2, Section 7, Class 6 for Herdsmanship Class open to all youth.

#### General Rules & Regulations for Livestock & Poultry (Excluding Horses)

- 1. Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members, or FFA, or agricultural education student enrolled in a Schoharie County elementary, middle or high school during the previous school year. Youth must be at least 8 years old to exhibit in premium classes. Youth who are between 5 and 8 years old, may exhibit for participation only in classes designated as CLOVERBUD classes.
- 2. All exhibits in this department will be governed under the same general rules and regulations that apply to other departments.
- 3. Entries should be postmarked by July 6th, unless specified otherwise. The address and payee is Cobleskill Agricultural Society, PO Box 249, Cobleskill NY 12043. No fee is required to enter except for the purchase of entrance tickets.
- 4. No Late entries will be accepted.
- 5. Exhibitors 18 and under must purchase a \$5 Youth weekly exhibitor ticket. The \$5 Youth Exhibitor ticket will be issued to the exhibitor upon placement of their entry. Otherwise, exhibitors and contestants must abide by regular admission regulations see general rules.
- 6. No passes will be mailed. All passes will be distributed by the Department Superintendents upon delivery of items for judging.
- 7. Submission of an entry implies the exhibitor has read and agrees to the Fair's General Rules and Regulations and the Department's Rules and Regulations plus all the Animal/Poultry Health Rules & Regulations.
- 8. Youth must be present at the time of judging. Each member is expected to be responsible for the showing and care of his or her own animal. Exceptions can be made under such circumstances or conditions as the agriculture educator may determine necessary. Up to two entries per class will be allowed. If an exhibitor has two entries in a class, the second entry must be shown by another youth who is also exhibiting in the show. Adult assistance is permitted on a case by case basis with the approval of the Cooperative Extension representative.
- 9. The awarding of ribbons and premiums shall be at the judge's discretion. The Danish system of awards will be used except where noted for Department 19.
- Animals/poultry cannot be put into housing until approved by Vet. Proper certificates and tags required. Drop off times are Sunday & Monday, August 4th & 5th from 9 am to 1 pm for all animals. All stalls, pens or cages must be labeled with contact person's name and best phone number.
- 11. All livestock exhibits will be released 7 p.m. on Sunday, August 11<sup>th</sup> and must be off the grounds before noon Monday, unless specified differently. Due to the release time and other activities on the grounds, extra measures have been taken to insure that safety and traffic patterns are not impacted in any negative way. Exhibits leaving before the permitted time will forfeit their premium money.
- 12. Footwear: Exhibitors are not permitted to wear flip flops in the animal barns. Sneakers or barn boots are strongly suggested.
- 13. Cloverbud Classes: Youth between the ages of 5 and 8 as of January 1 are considered Cloverbuds. Cloverbud aged youth may only enter designated Cloverbud classes for prizes and ribbons only. Cloverbuds may not enter premium classes.
- 14. It is expected that all Junior Department exhibitors will act in an appropriate manner. Any member of this department found conducting themselves in an improper manner or who violates any of the rules as set forth will forfeit any guarantee and premiums due and may be dismissed from the fairgrounds with exhibits. In addition, any parent displaying unsportsmanlike conduct may be subject to dismissal from the show grounds.
- 15. Junior Department exhibitors are urged to go home each evening. Exhibitors remaining on the fairgrounds must be chaperoned by a parent or guardian 21 or older.
- 16. Junior Department exhibitors remaining on the grounds overnight must be in their sleeping quarters by 11 p.m. No exhibitors may be in the barns after 11 p.m. No clipping of animals after 11 p.m.

#### JUNIOR DEPT - POULTRY

#### Rules & Regulations (In addition to General Rules & Regulations)

- All birds must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor before June 1 of the current year.
- Reservations for pens must be submitted on entry.
- Birds must be in show quality condition: clean, healthy, vigorous, mature for classification, fully feather (meaning no unnatural bare areas), and free from lice and mites. The superintendent is authorized to exclude all exhibits not properly prepared for show or showing a diseased condition. Any poultry disqualified for participation in the Fair should be removed from the premises by the end of the same day.
- Please provide your own water and feed dishes. Exhibitors will be responsible for the feeding, watering and care of their exhibits.
- All poultry must be labeled as to owner, address, breed and class number.
- Each exhibitor will be limited to one entry per class except in classes 5, 6, 7 & 8 in which two entries per class may be made if of two different breeds as defined in the American Standard of Perfection.
- Only purebred birds may be entered in classes 5-10 and 16-27. Purebreds or crossbreds may be entered in classes 11-15.
- Judging of standard and bantam bred birds will be based on the American Standard of Perfection and the American Bantam Association Standard.
- Production birds will be judged on recommended production characteristics for meat or eggs.
- The Poultry Show will take place on Tuesday, August 8th at 9 am in the Sheep/Goat Barn. All poultry exhibitors must be present, and each exhibitor, at the direction of the judge, will present individual poultry exhibits to the judge for evaluation and determination of award.
- As a health precaution, all live poultry should be kept strictly isolated for 15 days or more or be sold and not returned to the home flock.
- Ribbons will be awarded to the Champion of Show for Poultry and to the Grand Champion Poultry Showman. In addition, ribbons will be awarded to the Best of Show Production and the Best of Show Exhibition.

### General Rules & Regulations for Livestock & Poultry (Excluding Horses)

- 1. Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members, or FFA, or agricultural education student enrolled in a Schoharie County elementary, middle or high school during the previous school year. Youth must be at least 8 years old to exhibit in premium classes. Youth who are between 5 and 8 years old, may exhibit for participation only in classes designated as CLOVERBUD classes.
- 2. All exhibits in this department will be governed under the same general rules and regulations that apply to other departments.
- 3. Entries should be postmarked by July 6th, unless specified otherwise. The address and payee is Cobleskill Agricultural Society, PO Box 249, Cobleskill NY 12043. No fee is required to enter except for the purchase of entrance tickets.
- 4. No Late entries will be accepted.
- 5. Exhibitors 18 and under must purchase a \$5 Youth weekly exhibitor ticket. The \$5 Youth Exhibitor ticket will be issued to the exhibitor upon placement of their entry. Otherwise, exhibitors and contestants must abide by regular admission regulations see general rules.
- 6. No passes will be mailed. All passes will be distributed by the Department Superintendents upon delivery of items for judging.
- 7. Submission of an entry implies the exhibitor has read and agrees to the Fair's General Rules and Regulations and the Department's Rules and Regulations plus all the Animal/Poultry Health Rules & Regulations.
- 8. Youth must be present at the time of judging. Each member is expected to be responsible for the showing and care of his or her own animal. Exceptions can be made under such circumstances or conditions as the agriculture educator may determine necessary. Up to two entries per class will be allowed. If an exhibitor has two entries in a class, the second entry must be shown by another youth who is also exhibiting in the show. Adult assistance is permitted on a case by case basis with the approval of the Cooperative Extension representative.
- 9. The awarding of ribbons and premiums shall be at the judge's discretion. The Danish system of awards will be used except where noted for Department 20.
- Animals/poultry cannot be put into housing until approved by Vet. Proper certificates and tags required. Drop off times are Sunday & Monday, August 4th & 5th from 9 am to 1 pm for all animals. All stalls, pens or cages must be labeled with contact person's name and best phone number.
- 11. All livestock exhibits will be released 7 p.m. on Sunday, August 11<sup>th</sup> and must be off the grounds before noon Monday, unless specified differently. Due to the release time and other activities on the grounds, extra measures have been taken to insure that safety and traffic patterns are not impacted in any negative way. Exhibits leaving before the permitted time will forfeit their premium money.
- 12. Footwear: Exhibitors are not permitted to wear flip flops in the animal barns. Sneakers or barn boots are strongly suggested.
- 13. Cloverbud Classes: Youth between the ages of 5 and 8 as of January 1 are considered Cloverbuds. Cloverbud aged youth may only enter designated Cloverbud classes for prizes and ribbons only. Cloverbuds may not enter premium classes.
- 14. It is expected that all Junior Department exhibitors will act in an appropriate manner. Any member of this department found conducting themselves in an improper manner or who violates any of the rules as set forth will forfeit any guarantee and premiums due and may be dismissed from the fairgrounds with exhibits. In addition, any parent displaying unsportsmanlike conduct may be subject to dismissal from the show grounds.
- 15. Junior Department exhibitors are urged to go home each evening. Exhibitors remaining on the fairgrounds must be chaperoned by a parent or guardian 21 or older.
- 16. Junior Department exhibitors remaining on the grounds overnight must be in their sleeping quarters by 11 p.m. No exhibitors may be in the barns after 11 p.m. No clipping of animals after 11 p.m.

#### JUNIOR DEPARTMENT - GOATS

#### Rules & Regulations (In addition to General Rules & Regulations)

- Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members, or FFA, or agricultural education student enrolled in a Schoharie County elementary, middle or high school during the previous school year. Youth must be at least 8 years old to exhibit in premium classes. Youth who are between the ages of 5 and 8 years old (as of January 1) may exhibit only in Cloverbud Showmanship for participation only. No premiums will be paid to Cloverbuds. Cloverbud aged youth are not eligible to exhibit in any breed classes.
- All goats must be vaccinated against rabies following the same protocol as for other species
- The Junior Department Goat Show will take place on **Thursday, August 10** at 9 a.m. The show will begin with Fitting and Showmanship, followed by meat goat classes, then dairy goat classes, followed by market, pet/working class, and then fiber goats.
- Entries may be registered or grade. All animals entered must have either registration papers showing ownership (registered animals), or a statement of ownership (for non-registered animals only), or a certificate of non-ownership. Animals need not be owned by the exhibitor. Youth already owning an animal of a particular species cannot exhibit a non-owned animal of the same species. A non-ownership certificate must be supplied by June 1 of the current year. All entries must have been cared for by the exhibitor continually since June 1 of the current year. Youth are limited to showing two non-owned animals.
- Goats with horns and bucks will not be permitted except in meat goat classes.
- Feed, bedding and care must be furnished by the exhibitor.
- To compete at State Fair, animals must be purebred or recorded grade <u>and</u> owned by the exhibitor <u>and</u> registered in the exhibitor's name by June 1 of the current year.
- Entries must meet the state health requirements as listed in the open class section of this book. Any animal disqualified for participation in the Fair should be removed by the end of the same day.
- A class will be divided by breed if the number of entries warrants it. The judge may combine classes deemed to have too few entries.
- Animals shown in group classes must have been shown in breed classes.

#### DAIRY GOAT SHOWMANSHIP

Each exhibitor must participate in fitting and showmanship and must enter the appropriate class on their entry form.

Exhibitors of dairy goats must wear white. Exhibitors of meat, fiber and pet goats must wear dark pants and clean neat shirts with sleeves. All exhibitors must present a neat and professional appearance. No sandals, flip-flops, T-shirts or sleeveless shirts allowed.

#### Ribbons will be awarded as follows:

Championship Ribbons: Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Senior Champion, Reserve Senior Champion, Junior Champion, Reserve Junior Champion, Champion Showman, Reserve Champion Showman, Best Udder, Grand Champion Meat Animal, Reserve Grand Champion Meat Animal.

- Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members, or FFA, or agricultural education student enrolled in a Schoharie County elementary, middle or high school during the previous school year. Youth must be at least 8 years old to exhibit in premium classes. Youth who are between 5 and 8 years old, may exhibit for participation only in classes designated as CLOVERBUD classes.
- 2. All exhibits in this department will be governed under the same general rules and regulations that apply to other departments.
- 3. Entries should be postmarked by July 6th, unless specified otherwise. The address and payee is Cobleskill Agricultural Society, PO Box 249, Cobleskill NY 12043. No fee is required to enter except for the purchase of entrance tickets.
- 4. No Late entries will be accepted.

### General Rules & Regulations for Livestock & Poultry (Excluding Horses)

- Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members, or FFA, or agricultural education student enrolled in a Schoharie County elementary, middle or high school during the previous school year. Youth must be at least 8 years old to exhibit in premium classes. Youth who are between 5 and 8 years old, may exhibit for participation only in classes designated as CLOVERBUD classes.
- 2. All exhibits in this department will be governed under the same general rules and regulations that apply to other departments.
- 3. Entries should be postmarked by July 6th, unless specified otherwise. The address and payee is Cobleskill Agricultural Society, PO Box 249, Cobleskill NY 12043. No fee is required to enter except for the purchase of entrance tickets.
- 4. No Late entries will be accepted.
- 5. Exhibitors 18 and under must purchase a \$5 Youth weekly exhibitor ticket. The \$5 Youth Exhibitor ticket will be issued to the exhibitor upon placement of their entry. Otherwise, exhibitors and contestants must abide by regular admission regulations see general rules.
- 6. No passes will be mailed. All passes will be distributed by the Department Superintendents upon delivery of items for judging.
- 7. Submission of an entry implies the exhibitor has read and agrees to the Fair's General Rules and Regulations and the Department's Rules and Regulations plus all the Animal/Poultry Health Rules & Regulations.
- 8. Youth must be present at the time of judging. Each member is expected to be responsible for the showing and care of his or her own animal. Exceptions can be made under such circumstances or conditions as the agriculture educator may determine necessary. Up to two entries per class will be allowed. If an exhibitor has two entries in a class, the second entry must be shown by another youth who is also exhibiting in the show. Adult assistance is permitted on a case by case basis with the approval of the Cooperative Extension representative.
- 9. The awarding of ribbons and premiums shall be at the judge's discretion. The Danish system of awards will be used except where noted for Department 25.
- 10. Animals/poultry cannot be put into housing until approved by Vet. Proper certificates and tags required. Drop off times are Sunday & Monday, August 4th & 5th from 9 am to 1 pm for all animals. All stalls, pens or cages must be labeled with contact person's name and best phone number.
- 11. All livestock exhibits will be released 7 p.m. on Sunday, August 11<sup>th</sup> and must be off the grounds before noon Monday, unless specified differently. Due to the release time and other activities on the grounds, extra measures have been taken to insure that safety and traffic patterns are not impacted in any negative way. Exhibits leaving before the permitted time will forfeit their premium money.

In addition, any parent displaying unsportsmanlike conduct may be subject to dismissal from the show grounds.
- Junior Department exhibitors are urged to go home each evening. Exhibitors remaining on the fairgrounds must be chaperoned by a parent or guardian 21 or older.
   Junior Department exhibitors remaining on the grounds overnight must be in their sleeping quarters by 11 p.m. No exhibitors may be in the barns after 11 p.m. No clipping of animals after 11 p.m.

The Dog Show will take place on Saturday, August 10 at 10 am in the Show Barn. Dogs will be allowed entrance to the Fairgrounds starting at 10 a.m.

- Dogs are not permitted in any of the commercial or midway areas of the Fair. Dogs may be walked between the Livestock Barns and the backtrack area near the horse stalls.
- Dogs may not be tied or left unattended inside a car or truck. Dogs may be kept in a crate or camper prior to the show.
- Dogs must be vaccinated against rabies and proof of vaccination must be available prior to the show. It is recommended that dogs also have current vaccinations against distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis, and parvovirus.
- Females who are in heat are not allowed to be exhibited and should not be brought to the Fair.
- All dogs must be a least six months of age.
- Classes and scoring will follow the NYS 4-H Dog Show rules, unless otherwise indicated. Generally classes will follow AKC rules and scoring.
- Exhibitors (youth/dog team) who have been awarded a blue ribbon in the previous year's Fair MUST advance to the next level.
- Appropriate Dress: Clothing must be neat, clean and properly fitting with no rips or tears. No cut-off shorts, midrift, spaghetti straps or tank tops. Shoes must be closed toed. No sandals or flip flops will be permitted.
- No bait or food is allowed in the ring.
- Exhibitors may only enter one class.
- A champion ribbon and premium will be given to the highest scoring dog in each obedience class, provided that a qualifying score is obtained.

### **Rules & Regulations For Non-Livestock Exhibits**

- 1. Competition is open to enrolled Schoharie County 4-H members, or any home economics or agricultural education student enrolled in a Schoharie County elementary, middle or high school during the previous school year. Youth must be at least 8 years old to exhibit in premium classes. Youth who are between 5 and 8 years old, may exhibit for participation only in classes designated as CLOVERBUD classes.
- 2. All exhibits in this department will be governed under the same general rules and regulations that apply to other departments.
- 3. Entries should be received by July 6th, unless specified otherwise. The address and payee is Cobleskill Agricultural Society, PO Box 249, Cobleskill NY 12043.
- 4. No late entries will be accepted.
- 5. Exhibitors 18 and under may purchase a \$5 Youth Exhibitor ticket. This \$5 Youth Exhibitor ticket may be used for admission throughout the duration of the fair. The \$5 Youth Exhibitor ticket will be issued to the exhibitor upon placement of their entry. Otherwise, exhibitors and contestants must abide by regular admission regulations see general rules. Each exhibitor is allowed only one pass not to be combined with other entry forms. It is the exhibitor responsibility to pick up their purchased exhibitor ticket at the time they place their entry. No replacement tickets will be provided if the exhibitor fails to pick up their ticket at the time the entry is dropped off.
- 6. No passes will be mailed. All passes will be distributed by the Department Superintendents upon delivery of items for judging.
- 7. Submission of an entry implies the exhibitor has read and agrees to the Fair's General Rules and Regulations and the Department's Rules and Regulations.
- 8. Footwear: Exhibitors are not permitted to wear flip flops in the animal barns. Sneakers or barn boots are strongly suggested.
- 9. Non-animal exhibits will be judged on Saturday, August 3rd between 1:00 and 4 p.m. in Progressland. Youth must present their exhibit to a judge and be available to answer questions related to their exhibit. Any youth department exhibitor who is unable to be present at judging may have someone else bring their exhibits to judging provided an exhibitor's statement card has been filled out for each entry. Cards are available at the Cooperative Extension 4-H office prior to judging. No exhibits for which the youth is not present will be judged for a premium without the exhibitor's statement card.
- 10. Cloverbud Classes: Youth between the ages of 5 and 8 as of January 1 are considered Cloverbuds. Cloverbud aged youth may only enter designated Cloverbud classes for prizes and ribbons only. Cloverbuds may not enter premium classes.
- 11. The Danish system of awards will be used except where noted.
- 12. All Junior Department non animal exhibits must be collected from Progressland between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on the Monday after the fair unless other arrangements have been made. Anything left becomes the property of the fair.
- 13. It is expected that all Junior Department exhibitors will act in an appropriate manner. Any member of this department found conducting themselves in an improper manner or who violates any of the rules as set forth will forfeit any guarantee and premiums due and may be dismissed from the fairgrounds with exhibits. Achievement/Record Book/Officer Book The book is a collection of items assembled to demonstrate involvement in projects and activities during the current4-H year. Evaluators will be looking for an attractive cover and title page, a table of contents and/or the use of section dividers. and content that reflects involvement in 4-H experiences such as leadership experiences, marketing/public relations, exhibits, projects, community service, presentations, and other activities completed in the current 4-H year. All items such as certificates, and pictures displayed in the book should be labeled to reflect what experiences they relate to. The book must contain a story that summarizes the accomplishment and skills learned throughout the current year in 4-H. 4-H Officer Book is NOT judged.

#### Scrap Book

The Scrap Book reflects the use of creative scrapbooking techniques to tell about events and/or activities. The theme may be 4-H or non 4-H in nature. The Scrap Book must have been completed in the current 4-H year. Exhibits will be evaluated on overall appearance and creativity and the appropriate use of scrapbooking techniques to tell a story. If the scrapbook reflects the activities of the 4-H Club, the work must be completed solely by one 4-H youth member and not be a group/club effort. Club scrapbooks may be entered in the open class category.

#### **Press Releases or Editorials**

Entries submitted need to demonstrate the 4-H youth member's ability to share information with the various media outlets for the purpose of informing the public about their achievements and accomplishments during the current 4-H year. If the press release was printed in the local newspaper, please include a copy of the published release, indicating date of release and title of publication.

#### **4-H Portfolio**

Annual 4-H Member Portfolio and Annual Cloverbud Member Portfolio Annual 4-H Member Portfolio is an organized summary of a member's 4-H experience on a yearly basis. It must be submitted to the 4-H office by October 1 of each year in order to receive the yearend completion award. The Annual 4-H Member Portfolio can be submitted as a fair entry.

#### **Creative Writing**

Creative writing will be evaluated on content, standard punctuation and grammar, rhyme (if applicable), use of expressions, actions, dialogue and overall "tone" of the written piece. How the piece is presented and neatness and creativity of the presentation will also be considered in the evaluation.

- No exhibits requiring refrigeration (cream or custard-based pies, cakes, cream cheese) are allowed.
- Our goal is to encourage the mastery of skills. Fewer ingredients generally mean a simpler recipe. The more experienced 4-H member is encouraged to exhibit a more difficult recipe. Exhibitors are also encouraged to not exhibit in the same class year after year. Again, this is to demonstrate mastering of new skills.
- ✓ Please do your best to demonstrate good nutritional choices in your recipe.
- Remove all items from baking pans (except pies) and exhibit on paper plates or foil-wrapped cardboard. The exhibit must be covered with plastic resealable baggies –no plastic wrap. Do not bake muffins or cupcakes in paper liners.
- Include recipe card (product name, ingredients, preparation steps, yield, recipe source) with all baked entries. Indicate how the recipe was modified to make it healthier.
- An exhibit is: 3 samples of small items (cookies, muffins, cupcakes, rolls, breadsticks, pretzels or similar products); ½ of large item (loaf bread, cake, coffee cake or similar products); or whole item if needed to convey appearance of product (pie, turtle-shaped bread or similar products).



# GENERAL INFORMATION FOR HORTICULTURE EXHIBITS

- Exhibitor must fully complete at least one green Entry Card including questions for at least one project in each division.
- If entering more than one exhibit in a division, you must complete a green Entry Card. You may exhibit one entry per class except where noted.
- Participants are encouraged to work together as groups to create exhibits.
- Individual exhibits are also acceptable.
- Evaluators will consider number of participants so that group projects will be evaluated appropriately.
- Age, experience and standards listed in related 4-H publications, as well as content and quality, will be considered in evaluating criteria.
- Project resource materials listed are for suggestions only. Use your imagination for other ideas. For more information and ideas, check the website: http://www.hort.cornell.edu/4hplants.
- Endangered species are not allowed in any exhibit.
- Under Floral Design –Classes 25, 26 and 27 may use purchased or wild flowers.

# PLANT COLLECTIONS

Developing a plant collection will help youth to learn to recognize and identify different plant species.

- A. Preserved
  - Plants must be pressed, dry, mounted and labeled. To press plant material, it is best to use the method described in: Pressed Flower Pictures (1982), 141-IB-34, find at http://dspace.library.cornell.edu/handle/1813/3267, or as described by a person who has experience collecting plant material.
  - A clear protective overlay is helpful for many, but not all exhibits.
  - Weeds and other specimens mounted green (not pressed or dry) will not be evaluated.
  - Collections of plants may be on one side of ONE PIECE of poster board or like material, 22 x 28 inches in size, or in notebook binders with single specimens on pages 8 1/2 x 11 inches.
  - Scrapbooks of accumulating years should have dividers between years. Current year's exhibit should be clearly marked. Current year exhibit will be judged.
  - List sources used to identify plants and plant materials.
  - Plants Identified by Common and Scientific Name.

The intent of this division is to generate an interest among young people in a science-based approach to horticulture. Guidelines and suggestions for the exhibitor working with plants: Both how you plan your experiment and the final description for your display should include the following sections:

- Background. Describe why you did this experiment and why it is important to you and other people?
- The Question (or hypothesis). What specific question does your experiment try to answer? For
- example: "Does watering geraniums with coffee increase their growth?"

Methods. Outline how you did the experiment. Be sure to include:

 a)Treatments. Describe specifically what you are comparing as treatments. Remember that you should have a check treatment (what is usually done) and the 'test' treatment. From the above question: Check = watering with water, and treatment = watering with coffee.
 b)Measurements. Describe what you are measuring (weight, height, etc.) and why. Include observations of the plants over the course of the experiment.

Results.

a)What did your measurements tell you about the treatment compared to the check? Was there a difference and if so, why do you think so? Use tables, graphs or pictures to share what you learned. b)What other things did you notice in your observations?

• Conclusions. What did you learn? What is important about your results to other people? What would you suggest to someone else, based on what you learned?

THE DISPLAY should be interesting, attractive and neat, so that people will want to stop and learn about what you did. It should:

- include actual examples of treated and untreated plants, if possible, otherwise use drawings or photographs.
- On sheets of paper, describe your study using the above 5 sections.
- Use big print so that it is easy to read from 3 feet away.
- Glue these sheets, along with any photos or graphs to heavy poster paper (14" x 22" minimum) for display.

-Good clean; slight defects in general appearance; defective and unusable parts should not exceed 5 percent; good market size and quality. Exhibits with more than one specimen: not more than 25 percent variation in sizes for fruits and vegetables, and cut flowers; only slightly detectable variation in shape, color and degree of maturity.

-Worthy-fairly clean; some defects in general appearance; defective and unusable parts should not exceed 10 percent; fair market size and quality. Exhibits with more than one specimen—not more than 100 percent variation in sizes for fruits and vegetables and cut flowers; noticeable variation in shape, color or degree of maturity.

-No Award-dirty, serious damage apparent; defective and unusable parts exceed 10 percent; unsatisfactory market size or quality. Exhibits with more than one specimen —

more than 100 percent variation in sizes for fruits and vegetables; extreme differences in shape, color or degree of maturity.

- Instead of a poster, an exhibit of the method itself (such as a small hydroponics set-up) can be displayed.

# ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

All exhibits in Section G must include, in addition to the completed green Entry Card, a project story (essay) on a separate sheet of paper, detailing: why you found your project interesting, its relevance to natural resources and/or environmental education, information and lessons you learned, and how the project might be used to help others learn about or appreciate the natural world.

- The length and detail of the essay should be appropriate for the exhibitor's age and level of familiarity with the project area. Critical, reflective thought is encouraged. Some projects directly relate to environmental education (e.g., they can be used to teach others about important environmental phenomena), other projects relate indirectly to environmental education by helping the exhibitor, through production of the exhibit, to learn for himself/herself a meaningful lesson about the environment. These lessons can then change the way the exhibitor views and interacts with the natural world. Whether through direct or indirect connection to environmental education, the exhibitor must explain in his/her essay how the project helped him/her to think and act differently to the natural world.
- For example, if the exhibit is a bluebird box, the essay may include an explanation of: why you chose the project, what made it interesting, what about the box makes it a good home for bluebirds, observations/plans you have to learn about bluebird behavior, why should people use bluebird boxes, how this project relates to the environment or natural resources, and what you learned while doing the project. You might also include how the project will be used to help others learn about or appreciate bluebirds and the habitat in which they live. If the project story does not accompany the exhibit, the exhibit will not receive a maximum score.
- Exhibits showing processes, products, skill development, and relevance to environmental/natural
  resource issues are strongly encouraged. Overly simplistic or non-interpretive exhibits will receive
  less recognition.
- Exhibits will be evaluated on the basis of their content, quality of expression and presentation. Creativity is encouraged as is display of materials showing observational skills, e.g. journals or sketchbooks. Age, experience and standards listed in appropriate 4-H publications will be included in the judging criteria.

Inclusion of field journals is strongly encouraged and identification criteria must be completely and clearly defined. Exhibits showing evolutionary histories, adaptations of fossil organisms, vertical or horizontal studies of strata, or similar studies are encouraged.
- Field Identification Projects -Please note that wildflowers are evaluated in Section F -Horticulture, Fungi in Section H, -Plant Pathology, and Insects in Section I -Entomology. Collections of preserved specimens, photographs or sketches properly labeled and showing identification criteria may be displayed for any habitat in New York. Consult your local Department of Environmental Conservation for guidelines and permission in collecting specimens from the wild. Consult Field Guides Made Easy for additional activities and ideas.
- County-or self-initiated projects that relate to environmental education.
   Examples include but are not limited to: interpretation of aerial photographs; vegetation maps; plant adaptations; demonstrations of ecological principles; or computer models like GIS. Transfer of display ideas and concepts from other project areas is encouraged.

Examples are Lego\*, K'nex\*, Brio\* and Mechano\*, but projects are not limited to these examples. Projects can incorporate design, following instructions, three dimensional thinking, design modifications, problem solving, creativity, architecture, structural design, principles of mechanics and use of color in the planning and design process. These skills relate to the professions of engineering, science, construction, architecture and art.

Evaluation will be based on completion, complexity, presentation and explanation of design, understanding of principles and visual presentations. Must include following:

- Number of pieces: Youth must know the approximate number of pieces used in assembly. For kits, this number is on the box. It is understood that after a long creative process, it may be difficult to know exact number of small pieces; the youth must provide an estimate rounded to 25.
- Diagrams: diagrams are required. A diagram could be a photograph printed on printer paper, a scale drawing on graph paper, a photocopy of an instruction sheet or a variable scale rough drawing. Relevant labels and explanations must be added. The diagram must include: 1. Name of youth; 2. the title of the project; 3. The exact or approximate number of pieces and a self-judgment of complexity level (a. easy, less than one hour to assemble; b. Medium, 1 –3 hours construction time; or c. Complex, more than 3 hours of construction time). Juniors may use a photocopy of kit provided drawings for the basis of their diagrams, but brand logo MUST be covered and not visible. The diagram can be displayed in a plastic stand, mounted on poster board or attached in a folder. Art value, ability of written work to attract, use of color and use of font add to design presentation.
- Protection: Youth may prepare a display box for the project. There is no evaluation or points for this box; it is merely protection. A simple box could be a cardboard box with two sides removed and replaced with clear plastic.
